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

Presidential Address

Below is an article written by Sharon's mother that was published in the Harrisburg Community Review this summer. We thought it was relevant to our community. We are happy to report that we have been very proactive in upgrading our security but feel we could do more to reach out to the community in a peaceful, friendly way.

In recent years, we have become increasingly exposed to news of violent gun attacks on innocent children, religious observers and people out enjoying a good time. When these events happen, we cry, and send prayers to the afflicted, but in reality nothing has changed. If anything, the situation is getting worse.

For those of us in the Jewish community it seems anti-Semitism is on the rise, and once again in the history of our people we must look over our shoulders and be aware of our surroundings. As we come together in our places of worship, we are installing increased security and trying to reassure ourselves that we are safe.

This is a tragedy that is unfolding not just here in the U.S. but in other places around the world. We especially think of the attack on the Jewish community in Paris last year. Attacks on Christians in Egypt and on Muslims in China. I believe we need to think of these attacks as not isolated fragmented incidents, but as a global shift in thinking towards violence, possibly linked to a fear of change and the mass movements of populations seeking a safer, more prosperous life for their children.

The sad truth is that nothing can guarantee our safety from an individual with a loaded gun or a knife or even a vehicle and hate in in his/her heart. The other sad truth is that we, the people being targeted must bear the expense of these threats.

Some years ago, as we drove on the highways there were signs "beware of aggressive drivers". Why? I wondered as the innocent person must I beware. Now, again, we the innocent must "beware" because some sick people are being stirred up to target us.

These costs are not unsubstantial. To install or increase security can run thousands of dollars. This is money many small, struggling, congregations do not have. Thus, it becomes only the large, prosperous communities that can afford the security thought necessary for protection. The poorer, smaller communities are left with the option of doing nothing and hoping we will remain safe.

Or closing the doors, which is what those who target us want, to have us melt silently into the community and not stand out as persons with different belief systems that are somehow seen as a threat.

One of the slogans that has come to the fore in this time of danger is "Love is stronger than hate." Maybe now is a time to put those words into action. Instead of hiding behind locked doors venture out into the community, reach out to our neighbors of different faiths and try to establish a dialogue. In many local communities there are ecumenical thanksgiving services where many faiths come together to celebrate this quintessentially American holiday. Maybe here is a place to start, to develop more such opportunities for peaceful, friendly contact.

For those of us who are struggling to keep the doors open, facing declining membership and support, I would suggest that now is a time in our history that we need to come together, we can stand as Jews or we can slowly disappear into the assimilated population and know that the forces who hate us have won.
